Let A be an algebra. Let S be a set of operations on A. Suppose that S forms a single orbit under a group of hypersubstitutions. How large is the variation in the complexity of the operations from S on A? Examples taken from hyperquasigroups exhibit variation from polynomial to rational and from rational to algebraic. For unary hyperquasigroups, variation over complexity classes would demand a one-way function. Other examples of significant variation are provided by (complete) lattices such as subalgebra lattices, where (according to the algebra structure) there is variation between the meet and join.
