A pseudo-expectation for a C^* -inclusion $D \subset C$ is a generalization of a conditional expectation. Precisely it is a ucp map $\Phi : C \rightarrow I(D)$ such that $\Phi|_D = id$. (Here $I(D)$ is the injective envelope of D .) Whereas a C^* -inclusion may not admit any conditional expectations, it must have at least one pseudo-expectation, by injectivity. In this talk, based on recent joint work with David Pitts, we investigate the relationship between a C^* -inclusion and its pseudo-expectation space, in particular how the existence of a unique pseudo-expectation relates to structural properties of the inclusion. First we consider examples, emphasizing the cases of abelian inclusions and W^* -inclusions. Then we state some general results, the strongest of which hold when D is abelian. In that case there is a Krein-Milman theorem for the pseudo-expectation space, and an order-theoretic characterization of the unique pseudo-expectation property. Finally, as applications, we explore the connection between the unique pseudo-expectation property and norming (in the sense of Pop, Sinclair, and Smith), as well as its impact on C^* -envelope calculations.
